Updated Rules to Vote in 2015

Most cities hold elections in 2015. A few votes can decide who wins. The winners oversee the police and vital services.

1 NO ID. Most voters do NOT need to show an ID to vote in 2015. Some rules could change in court. To be safe, follow this card for 2015 and vote!

- 2 Local Elections. Cities in NC hold elections on different days. Learn the schedule and candidates for your area at www.NCVoter.org.
- 3 Sign Up. To vote, citizens must first register. Forms are at libraries, high schools or www.ncsbe.gov. If you register and don't vote, you're still registered. BUT register again if you change your address or name or finish serving a felony sentence.
- 4 Deadline. Be sure you are registered in your home county by 25 days before the election. Look yourself up at demnc.co/myreg.

- 5 Where's Home? Students may register at a campus address if you view it as home, or at another address where you intend to return.
 Register in just one place!
- 6 Felony. People with a felony record from any state can register and vote in NC <u>after</u> serving their sentence, including probation or parole. *No special document is needed*. Register like a new voter.
- **7** Vote by Mail. See "Absentee Voting" at www.ncsbe.gov to get a mail ballot. Any voter may do this. No excuse or reason is needed.

- 8 Penalty? You do <u>not</u> lose your right to vote if you have a warrant, fine, misdemeanor or bankruptcy.
- 9 Vote Early to avoid possible bad weather! Call your elections board listed on NCVoter.org for Early Voting hours/places. If you change your name or move within your county, you can update your registration during Early Voting.
- 10 On Election Day, polls are open from 6:30 AM to 7:30 PM. If you're in line at 7:30 PM, you will be allowed to vote. <u>Vote at your precinct's poll on Election Day</u>.

KEY RULES

- Register again if you move.
- On Election Day, you must vote at your precinct's poll.
- No straight-party voting.
- 11 Aid Inside. A family member can help you vote. A voter with a disability or reading hardship may get help from anyone but your employer or union agent. If you mess up a ballot, ask the official for a new one. If the voting room is not accessible due to age or physical disability, you can vote at the curb in a vehicle.
- 12 Ready for 2016? You will need to show one of these IDs in 2016 to vote with a regular ballot (see some other options below):
- NC driver's license or an ID card issued by the NC DMV;
- US military or veteran's ID card;
- US passport; or
- Tribal enrollment card.

Don't have one of these? Get a FREE ID from DMV. See www.GotIDNC.org or call 888-OUR-VOTE to learn how.

The ID's address doesn't matter but the name should resemble your name on the voter registration roll. If it doesn't, update your registration or ID <u>now</u>. If the ID is current when you turn 70, it's good for life.

ALTERNATIVE: If you can't easily get one of these IDs, you can use a provisional ballot. It counts if you give a reason for not having one and (1) give the last 4 digits of your SSN and birth date or (2) show a utility bill, registration card or bank or government document with name/address. See GotIDNC.org.

ALERT: You don't need a photo ID if you use a mail-in ballot (see #7) or qualify for curbside voting.

13 Inside Poll. You may wear a

shirt or hat with a candidate's name in the polls, or take in a list of your choices to help you remember, but don't call attention to these items. Do not use a cell phone or camera.

14 Back-up. If a problem means you can't use a regular ballot at the poll, you have a right to a *provisional ballot* and to learn if it counted.
