LOBBYISTS PAID \$14.5 MILLION IN 2005 "LONG SESSION"

New Law Poised to Reveal Details Hidden By Old Law

Lobbyists prowling the halls of the NC General Assembly received \$14.5 million from their clients in 2005, the year with the last "long session." That amounts to \$85,400 for each of the 170 legislators, according to Bob Hall of Democracy North Carolina, the nonpartisan watchdog group that conducted the analysis from data compiled by the NC Secretary of State.

"Lobbyists play a vital role in providing useful information from different, often competing interests," said Hall, "but lobbying is a public process, not a private transaction, so it's vital for the public to know about the large sums of money involved. In North Carolina, interest groups actually spend more on lobbying than their PACs spend on campaign contributions to state legislators."

The 2005 session is best known for the narrow adoption of the state-run lottery and the illegal lobbying of Meredith Norris and her client, Scientific Games International. Amended reports from Scientific Games disclose it paid Norris and vice president Alan Middleton \$41,372 in 2005.

The company's rival, GTECH, which eventually won the lottery contract, disclosed paying five lobbyists a total of \$106,000 during 2005.

Other big spenders in 2005 weighed in on such topics as pay raises for state employees, the alcohol content in beer, stormwater management and drinking water protection, changes in the workers compensation system, utility regulation, video poker, tax subsidies, and predatory lending.

Summary files from the Secretary of State* show that 17 special interests paid their lobbyists over \$100,000 and another 29 paid at least \$72,500. These 46 account for 32% of the \$14.5 million that 721 businesses, trade associations, and nonprofits paid their registered lobbyists in 2005.

The top four groups and their lobbyists' pay are: NC Citizens for Business & Industry (\$220,715 for 11 lobbyists), State Employees Association (\$186,650), NC Assn. of Electric Cooperatives (\$179,958) and the NC Academy of Trial Lawyers (\$178,823).

The \$14.5 million paid to lobbyists in 2005 is 45% more than the \$10.0 million listed on the 2003 reports processed by the Secretary of State's office. But Hall said an exact comparison is not possible because the Secretary's summary files for 2003 still omit data from many reports submitted late, after an analysis by Democracy North Carolina identified over 100 missing reports for 2003.

Data for the 2006 "short session" is not yet available in a convenient format from the Secretary of State, because reports for the second half of 2006 were not due until last week. Reports for 2005-2006 followed the semi-annual schedule and lax requirements of a law that was changed last year.

Because of loopholes in the old law, Democracy North Carolina found that:

- 82 percent of the 721 principals reported no spending in 2005, beyond a single figure for the compensation paid to their lobbyists and occasionally the registration fee paid to the Secretary.
- 18 percent of the principals reported spending \$512,248 in other areas, including \$251,286 for food and entertainment, \$63,929 for transportation and lodging, and \$174,378 for other items.

A new law, covering lobbying activities after January 1, 2007, closes several "loopholes," prohibits most gift-giving and entertainment, and requires disclosure of more details, more often, about permitted spending that benefits legislators or executive branch officials. Reports for spending during February, the first full month of the 2007 General Assembly, are due next week and should provide important clues about how well the new law is working, Hall said.

"We've gone from one of the weakest laws in the nation to one of the strongest. In fact, it's important that some provisions are not interpreted by regulators so narrowly that the law stifles public interactions between legislators and their constituents," he said. One useful interpretation will require principals to list the amount *each* lobbyist receives, rather than just one lump sum.

The reports for 2005 reveal a wide range of compensation – and highlight some mysteries:

- It's not surprising that computer giant <u>Dell Inc.</u> invested \$105,000 in lobbyists, but what policy issues were involved in the \$130,586 that engineering firm <u>Hayes Seay Mattern & Mattern</u> paid to it lobbyists? Or the \$90,000 paid by <u>US Airways</u> or \$110,019 by the <u>Center for International Education</u> or \$74,708 by <u>Corning Inc.</u> or \$76,904 by <u>DaVita Inc.?</u>
- The <u>NC Chiropractic Association</u> paid its lobbyist \$29,713 and <u>optometrists</u> didn't even hire a lobbyist. Both groups benefited from now-famous special provisions in the 2005 budget tied to illegal contributions involving ex-Speaker Jim Black. Meanwhile the <u>NC Amusement Machine Association</u>'s lobbyists got \$79,275 to keep video poker alive, one last year.
- Eleven groups whose PACs rank among the state's 25 biggest also ranked among the top 50 principals for compensation paid in 2005: NC Assn. of Electric Coops, Academy of Trial Lawyers, NC Assn. of Realtors, Duke Energy, NC Hospital Assn., NC Home Builders, NC Medical Assn., Progress Energy, Sprint/Embarg, NC Beer & Wine Wholesalers Assn., and Bank of America.
- "Predatory lending" groups seeking to <u>raise interest rates on certain loans paid their lobbyists</u> <u>over \$300,000</u>: World Acceptance Corp. (\$106,875), CompuCredit's Purpose Solutions (\$80,398), NC Financial Services Assn. (\$35,700), Community Financial Services (\$32,000), Cash America Intl. (\$25,000), NC Independent Financial Assn. (\$20,700), and Check into Cash (\$18,500).
- <u>116 of the 721 principals reported paying their lobbyists nothing</u>, perhaps because nothing special emerged in the 2005 session or because the group misunderstood or disobeyed the law.
- Significant spending is often omitted from the reports e.g., the \$24,500 Scientific Games paid Kevin Geddings in 2005 for communications and the amount the NC Association of Educators paid on ads for the lottery bill. Even the new law won't disclose all lobbying costs, but it should capture (a) spending by lobbyists and lobby groups that benefits state officials, (b) compensation of lobbyists, and (c) significant spending to mobilize the general public to lobby.

^{*} Our original release cited the \$203,500 listed on reports submitted by the NC Insurance Federation, but it then filed amendments saying compensation was \$43,956 for 2005, which reduced the grand total to \$14.5 million.
