But the program will only work if you do your part: Mark a check-off box on your N.C. income-tax form. See Action Item 2 inside.

Public financing is now available for candidates for some offices in N.C.

 Under a public financing program, candidates can receive public funds – IE they raise small, qualifying donations from voters and refuse large donations.

N.C. legislature raise, on average, only 40% as much as whites do; they are at a disadvantage.

As Dr. King said, our vote means little if we have no one to vote for. The high cost of campaigns pushes and gives wealthy donors too much clout. We need a public financing system so voters "own" elections.

 Many towns have elections in 2009 for local officials – are you ready to make a difference in who wins?

 Every vote matters. For example, if just 5 voters for Barack Obama in each precinct had <u>not</u> voted, he would have lost in N.C.

 Even with the big turnout in 2008, almost 1 out of 3 adult citizens in N.C. (of all races) did not vote.

188,000 vote who might be excluded – most were youth or people of color. M.C.'s new law allowing Same-Day Registration at Early Voting sites helped

 A higher percent of Blacks voted than Whites – a first in 110 years, since the Jim Crow-era of violence and disenfranchisement began.

More than 1 million African
 Americans voted in 2008
 in N.C. and that made a
 big difference in who won.

The Fund (1) pays for a Voter Guide to inform us about state candidates and (2) gives those candidates the option of using public campaign funds if they limit spending and refuse big donations.

The Fund is endorsed by John Hope Franklin, Julius Chambers, Henry and Shirley Frye, and other civic leaders. It helps a wider diversity of candidates win who don't have big-money connections.

## Follow Dr. King's Advice to Become A "Political Activist"

Dr. King was speaking less about joining a political party than about using our power as voters <u>and</u> advocates to unite around a reform agenda and "achieve many far-reaching changes." He said voting is not enough: "Everything we need will not like magic materialize from the use of the ballot." Get involved with civic groups in your area, help organize a local coalition. The groups listed on the back can help you.
