Note: Some of Duke Power and CP&L's funds go to South Carolina Politics, but the numbers here represent only a fraction of the proindustry lobby for nuclear waste. For example, N.C. Citizens for Business & Industry (NCCBI) reported spending \$200,000 on lobbying in 1995. Its members give several million dollars in political donations each year through their PACs. NCCBI's environment committee is headed by a Duke Power executive.

Key Facts About Duke Power & CP&L

^{**} Each year, nuclear power plants operated by Duke and CP&L produce 96 to 99.8% of the state's low-level radioactive waste (measured by curies).

^{**} Duke and CP&L have the 2nd and 3rd largest corporate PACs in N.C. (Number 1 for 1989-95 spending is Carolina Telephone & Telegraph).

- ** Duke and CP&L are represented in the legislature by Zeb Alley, the state's top-rated lobbyist, along with several other in-house and contract lobbyists.
- ** Duke and CP&L each contribute to over 100 legislative candidates, picking with a high success rate. In the last three elections, 81% of their PAC money went to winners.
- ** Of the 170 legislators now serving in the General Assembly, 85, or half, count Duke and/or CP&L among their 10 highest dollar donors.
- ** Since 1990, Governor Jim Hunt has received \$65,600 from executives, lobbyists and the PACs of Duke Power and CP&L.
